Mayor's Message

"If Lake Forest were an island, our excellent financial position would not be challenged."

Lake Forest IS in excellent financial condition. That was my bottom-line message at the recent Chamber of Commerce Annual Luncheon, where Lake Bluff Village President Kathleen O'Hara and I were the speakers. It

was a pleasure to address business owners and residents of Lake Forest and Lake Bluff, and to answer their questions.

Lake Forest's Triple A bond rating, built on sound fiscal policies and ample fund balance reserves, puts Lake Forest in durable condition for the time being. Eventually, however, the inability of the State of Illinois to address fiscal issues directly with real, long-term solutions will reach our community.

I've heard these State budgeting realities and concerning trends being discussed in grocery stores, on the golf course, and at dinner parties. Lake Foresters are taking notice and asking more questions of State and local officials they elect to office.

For decades, the City Councils and staff of the City of Lake Forest have routinely and thoughtfully made budget decisions consistent with sound long-term solutions. This long tradition of prudent fiscal decision-making, sound practices and long-term forecasting have prepared Lake Forest well for the gathering storm over Springfield.

The City Council will begin its budgeting process for Fiscal Year 2019 this September with a Special City Council Workshop to discuss fiscal stress parameters. At this workshop, City Council and staff will discuss potential fiscal scenarios driven by the acts and omissions of the State legislature and their impacts on the City's long-term financial plan.

Staff regularly examines City operations to determine if there are more efficient or more cost-effective methods for providing services to residents. Planning, preparation and proper alignment of goals and personnel are vital components of our long-term fiscal strategy. Lake Forest's 2017-2020 Strategic Plan outlines directives thoughtfully considered, achievable and sustainable. The Strategic Plan is available for your review on the City's website, cityoflakeforest.com.

During the past several months, the City has been in important discussions with the Lake Forest School Districts 67 and 115. Among the unfavorable scenarios being discussed in Springfield, such as some versions of school funding reform, a property tax freeze, and transferring the obligation for funding pensions to local school districts, will put most units of local government into fiscal danger if the State of Illinois decides to move in one or more of these directions. Since the public schools account for more than 50% of your tax bill, and our schools are a significant reason people move to our community, it is prudent and in all of our best interests to engage in joint, long-term financial planning.

On that note, I encourage you to attend a community forum that the City is co-hosting with the public school system on Tuesday, October 3, 7 p.m. at Gorton (see page 3). This public forum will give you a chance to learn more about the situation and ask questions of elected officials and staff.

I and the City Council appreciate your interest, ideas and opinions on this topic and all others. Please continue to communicate with us. Our contact information is listed on the back of the *Dialogue*.

Stop Idling, Start Saving!

Idling is running a vehicle engine when it's not moving or operating. While sometimes hard to avoid, idling is harmful and wasteful.

It pollutes and threatens health. Burning gasoline and diesel fuel emits:

- particulate matter, a leading cause of heart and lung disease
- ozone, which can damage lungs and
- carbon dioxide, a greenhouse gas.

Unnecessary idling is costly. An idling car wastes up to 1/2 gallon of gasoline per hour, and trucks waste even more. While individual episodes may be small, the cumulative impacts of idling are large. Residents are encouraged to turn off vehicles when parked and not traveling. Together, we can improve Lake Forest's air quality.

The City of Lake Forest established an Idling Management Policy for its vehicles and equipment in 2016. Check "Environmental Initiatives" at cityoflakeforest.com for more education and helpful information.



The City's Electric Aggregation Program Continues to be Monitored



At this time, in conjunction with the North Shore Electricity Aggregation Consortium (NSEAC), the City has opted to continue to idle its electricity aggregation program due to unfavorable commodity

pricing. Commonwealth Edison's (ComEd) supply rates remain highly competitive within the current market. All aggregation eligible Lake Forest electricity accounts are currently supplied by ComEd unless a third party supplier has been contracted by individual account holders. The NSEAC continues to monitor electricity commodity pricing, and should electricity supply rates become more favorable than those offered by ComEd, the City will look into an agreement and residents will be notified accordingly. As always, residents who wish to enter into individual contracts with third party electric suppliers may do so. While the City does not make recommendations on suppliers, the Illinois Commerce Commission has created pluginillinois.org as the State's official website to assist residents in comparing utility supply prices and offers from retail electricity suppliers.

Don't Make it Easy: How to Prevent Auto Theft and Auto Burglaries

The Lake Forest Police want to remind all residents to help stop crimes of opportunity in our community. During the last year, Lake Forest and surrounding communities have suffered a rash of car thefts and auto burglaries. **Lake Forest residents have reported 21 vehicles stolen and 47 vehicles burglarized from June 2016 to June 2017.**

All of these crimes had three things in common:

1. The cars were left unlocked in the driveway.
2. Keys or key fobs were left in the cars.
3. Something worth stealing was left in the car.

It takes less than 30 seconds to break into a car, grab what is in plain view, check the usual hiding places for other items, and get away. How long would it take for someone to steal your car when you leave the keys or key fob in the in the center console of the car? Even less time. Car thefts and auto burglary prevention, like all crime prevention, involves limiting the criminal's ability and/or opportunity to commit the crime.

Vehicle theft is more often a crime of opportunity, where thieves look for open doors and windows to search vehicles for valuables. Statistics show that would-be thieves will move on to another vehicle if your doors and windows are locked.

With very little time and effort, you can make a huge difference in your vulnerability to auto burglary and theft by taking these simple steps:

- Don't keep items of value in plain sight or take them out of the vehicle completely: cell phones, cameras, computers, wallets, purses, vehicle titles, etc. Thieves can sell your stuff for money and can get a lot of personal information from you about your home, family and friends.
- Make sure your car windows and doors are locked, even the trunk. Offenders will try to enter vehicles through open doors or trunks that have not been properly closed.
- Don't leave your keys or key fob inside the car. Thieves can not only steal your car, they will also have access to your home.

It only takes seconds to steal your car or steal your stuff!

It's not at all uncommon for thieves to walk down a neighborhood at night or down a row of parked vehicles at the mall and check vehicle doors to see if they are unlocked.

Fire Prevention Week: October 8-14

The theme for Fire Prevention Week this year is “EVERY SECOND COUNTS – PLAN 2 WAYS OUT”. In a fire, seconds count. Seconds can mean the difference between residents escaping safely from a fire or having their lives end in tragedy. That’s why this year’s theme is so important. It reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan. Here’s this year’s key campaign messages:

- Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, making two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.
- Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can’t help them.
- Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- Close doors behind you as you leave – this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.
