Mayor's Message

As we take a moment to look back on 2016, I would like to thank all of you for another great year in our beautiful community. I am so proud of all that we have accomplished together and look forward to a prosperous 2017.

As I have done in the past, I would like to review the highlights of the past year and mention things the City is doing going forward.

Aaa Rating by Moody's Investors Service: The City has once again received a Aaa bond rating, based upon our tax base, strong financial operations, sound reserves, operating flexibility and favorable debt profile. The Aaa rating is the highest available, and Lake Forest remains in an elite position with only a small percentage of municipalities in the U.S. granted this status. It is a testament to the City's prudent and long-range financial forecasting and management.

BMW 2017 Championship: Lake Forest and Conway Farms Golf Club will welcome back the Western Golf Association and the PGA Tour for a third time this coming fall. Mark your calendars for September 12-17 as the top 70 players in the world compete in the penultimate event of the PGA Tour's FedEx Cup Playoffs.

Economic Development: The City of Lake Forest has welcomed over a dozen new businesses in addition to the relocation/enlargement of many familiar businesses.

Lillard Science Center: Envisioning the future! A significant new addition and complete renovation of the existing science building is underway on the Middle Campus of Lake Forest College. Upon completion, this \$43 million project will establish a 130,000 sq. foot state-of-the-art research and teaching facility at the College.

Laurel and Western Avenues Redevelopment: Site preparation is underway at the former City Municipal Services site. Utility work requires periodic street and sidewalk closures, and the City is working closely with the developer to minimize disruption as much as possible. Excavation for the underground garage for the apartment buildings along the north, east and west sides of the property has begun. Once this work is far enough along, the apartment building on Franklin Place at the north-east corner of the site will be the first to be constructed.

Market Square North Alley: This attractive and inviting new outdoor gathering space will provide yet another unexpected treasure in the Central Business District. Please stop by, walk through or sit with some friends while having lunch or sipping coffee.

City of Lake Forest Marketing Campaign: The Marketing Team has been working with volunteer residents and advisors throughout the fall to create a campaign to promote the City. If you are interested in helping, please attend the Community Engagement Forum on Tuesday, January 10, 7 p.m. at LifeWorking.

Northwestern Medicine Lake Forest Hospital: The spectacular new hospital and campus is nearing completion. Work on the interior spaces is in full swing, and next spring, work will continue outside to finalize the new parking lot, eliminate the temporary parking lot and enhance the landscaping. Public discussions are now underway on preliminary plans for the reuse of the south campus.

2016 Resident Survey/Strategic Planning Process: The results of the Survey, presented at the November 21 City Council meeting, will help us outline priorities to be considered during the City Council's Strategic Planning sessions taking place this winter.

Lake Forest has had a very exciting and remarkable year, and we shall work to continue our success in 2017. I wish you and your families a Merry Christmas, a joyful Holiday Season and a happy and healthy New Year. I look forward to seeing you at the Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony in Market Square on November 25th!

ComEd Smart Meter Update: Opt-out Period to be Extended

Since June, Commonwealth Edison (“ComEd”) has been replacing analog electric meters with new smart meter technology in homes throughout the community. The installation of smart meters is a part of ComEd’s efforts to modernize the electric system to build a smart grid that will improve reliability, provide better service, and give customers greater control over their electricity use. The installation of smart meters has been endorsed by the Illinois General Assembly, through the adoption of the Energy Infrastructure Modernization Act.

As part of the Act, there is a mandate to install smart meters by 2019 throughout the ComEd service territory and customers do not have the option to permanently opt out of the program.

In response to the lack of options afforded to residents in this program, the Lake Forest City Council approved a resolution encouraging Commonwealth Edison to allow residents an opportunity to permanently opt out of the smart meter program. In response to this resolution and other similar resolutions passed by nearby communities, ComEd has submitted a filing with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC). This filing extends the deferral period for those customers that refuse the Smart Meter from December 31, 2019 to June 30, 2022.


It also proposes an opportunity for parties to engage policy makers on the possible development of permanent solutions. The City will continue to work with officials from ComEd to work toward a longer, if not perpetual, opt-out alternative.

East Side Train Station Renovations Nearing Completion

Come to the Preservation Foundation's
40th Birthday Party
and Community Open House

- Tour the newly-completed exterior restoration of the Station, designed by Frost & Granger in 1900
- View plans of the proposed interior renovation

- Kick off LFPF's Annual Fund dedicated to the Station's interior renovation (LFPF will match the first \$25,000 donated to this year's annual fund for the renovation!)

Join us at the East Side Train Station as we celebrate the Preservation Foundation's 40th Birthday! Come view and learn about the stunning restoration completed this fall of the historic 1900 Station's exterior, begun with the slate roof in 2011. Based on the LFPF-funded 2009 Historic Structure Report by Gunny Harboe's Chicago preservation architectural firm, the City was able to secure nearly \$3 million in Federal and Metra funds to carry out this restoration, overseen by Harboe himself. The grant will also include the creation of new restrooms in the former freight office and dry cleaning drop-off location south of the present waiting room.

Restoration of the waiting room itself, however, will require funding beyond the scope of the City, Metra and Federal dollars, obtained, due to unavoidable cost overruns for repairs and infrastructure. Completion of the interior of the north former bank and former ladies' waiting room is being saved for a future tenant. The Preservation Foundation proposes to return the current waiting room and corridors as they have been configured since the 1980s, much to their original appearance in 1900, including installing durable, close-to-original character flooring, restoring the wide plank horizontal paneling, and adding new light fixtures that recall the combination gas-and-electric fixtures that were there originally.

The Foundation hopes to be able to defray a large portion of this cost to enable the City not only to complement the superb quality of the restored exterior but also to recreate more effectively and more comfortably the men's waiting room of 1900. The LFPF Board of Directors is proud to announce that all funds donated during the Foundation's Annual Fund campaign, currently running through December 31, 2016, will be matched by the Foundation up to \$25,000.

Sanitation/Recycling

Compost/Recycling Center Winter Hours

Winter operating hours take effect December 1, and the Center will be open on Saturdays only from 8 a.m.-3 p.m. Residents using the site must display either a current Lake Forest vehicle sticker or a Lake Forest resident beach permit on their vehicle windshield (driver's licenses will not be accepted as proof of residency). No commercial contractor use of the Center is permitted.

Christmas Holiday

City offices will be closed on Friday, December 23 and Monday, December 26 in observance of the Christmas holiday. However, there will be no change in refuse, recycling or yard waste collection; regular routes will be in effect.

New Year Holiday

City offices will be closed on Monday, January 2 in observance of New Year's Day. However, there will be no change in refuse, recycling or yard waste collection; regular routes will be in effect.

Holiday Waste and Christmas Tree Recycling

During and after the holidays, please bag all loose wrapping paper and packing materials to keep them from littering the neighborhood and flatten cardboard boxes. Thank you!

During January, Christmas trees will be picked up on regularly-scheduled recycling days at the curb. Please remove all lights and ornaments, and cut trees into 6-foot lengths. In order to be collected, trees cannot be placed in plastic tree bags.

Vacation Security Tips

For all those who go on vacation or leave Lake Forest for the winter months, securing your home from burglars and other possible problems is a necessity. Here are a few ideas of things to consider:

- Call the Lake Forest Police Department and request a vacation watch (information below).
- Disconnect your garage door opener and make sure the door cannot be opened. Also lock the door between the garage and the inside of the house.
- Give a key and the alarm code to someone in the vicinity who can check on the house periodically. They can bring any deliveries inside and can check the interior for any issues. Ask them to open and close curtains and/or turn on and off lights to give the appearance that the house is occupied. They can also respond in the case of a burglar or fire alarm.
- For extended absences, have someone care for the exterior of the property, such as shoveling snow.
- Install timers on each level of your home. Lights, radios, or TVs that turn on and off help make the property look occupied and can deter burglars.
- Never hide a key outside your house. Burglars are very aware of many hide-a-key tricks.
- Stop all deliveries to your house: suspend mail and newspaper subscriptions.
- Don't advertise you are going out of town. The more people who know your house is vacant, the more vulnerable you are. Save your Facebook and Instagram posts for when you return.
- Don't list your home address on any luggage tags. Your cell phone number and/or email address should be all you need to re-connect with any lost luggage.

Lake Forest Police Department Implements Crisis Intervention Team


Over the past few decades, the disproportionate involvement of persons with serious mental illnesses in the criminal justice system has captured the attention of advocates, policy makers, practitioners, and news media. While mental health budgets are being slashed, resources are being devoted to approaches intended to stem the flow of persons with serious mental illnesses in the criminal justice system. For those who do enter the system, the hope is to reduce future criminal justice entanglement through positive intervention.

The Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) is designed to improve a police officer's ability to safely intervene, link individuals to mental health services, and divert them from the criminal justice system when appropriate. CIT programs enhance communication in the community and identify mental health resources for assisting families and individuals in crisis. Two Lake Forest Police officers attended this year's CIT International Conference held in Chicago. Both are certified as CIT officers after completing the 40-hour CIT training course.

Commander Rick Anderson and Detective Wendy Dumont, with the assistance of the Lake Forest Police Department social worker Linda Porter, are building a CIT program for Lake Forest from the ground up. The program was started to recognize and identify residents who may benefit from the service. Working with the individual's families, the CIT officers are often able to provide services instead of making arrests. Police Officers who may come into contact with these residents on a daily basis are made aware of any special circumstances that is available through the dispatch center, allowing them to have important information prior to arriving on the scene. The Police Officer then contacts a CIT officer if needed.

Lake Forest Police Department CIT leaders Commander Rick Anderson, Detective Wendy Dumont and Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor Linda Porter will host a Town Hall Meeting to explain the benefits of the CIT program, designed to enhance communication in the community and assist families and individuals in crisis.



The Police Department, with the help of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), is providing support for those who have a child with mental illness and education and support for families who have adult relatives with mental illness. If a family member has an Autism Spectrum Disorder, you can learn how to make LF Police and Fire Departments aware of certain protocols should there be an interaction with your family member.

Make Sure Your Home is Fire-Safe for the Holidays

Make sure your home is safe for the holidays by practicing safety before, during, and after the celebrations.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS

Be sure all decorative lights, indoor and outdoor bear the label of an independent testing laboratory. Replace any light sets that have cracked or frayed cords or have loose connections. Do not overload outlets or run extension cords under carpets, across doorways, on or under heaters, or behind furniture. Unplug all decorative lights before leaving home or going to bed.

CHRISTMAS TREES

Combustible vegetation and natural-cut Christmas trees are not permitted in assembly, educational, day-care, health-care, residential board and care, mercantile, hotel, or dormitory occupancies. If you purchase a live tree for residential use, either cut your own tree or buy a fresh one that's not shedding its needles. Check to see when the tree was cut if you buy it on a lot. Cut the trunk at an angle and install the tree in a large, deep, non-tip stand well away from fireplaces, heating ducts, and exits. Be sure your tree has a constant supply of water. Check the water level daily, especially when you first bring it into your house. If your tree dries out, remove it promptly and store it away from your house until you can dispose of it.



CANDLES



Always put candles in sturdy candleholders before you light them, and do not burn candles near decorations or displays. Keep candles well away from curtains, and never put candles in windows

or near exits. Don't leave candles burning unattended or within reach of small children. Arrange table candles safely away from flammable centerpieces and hanging decorations. Blow all candles out before you leave a room or go to sleep.

PARTY SAFETY

Use flame-retardant or non-combustible materials for decorations. Encourage smokers to smoke outside and provide them with deep, sturdy ashtrays. Before you throw out cigarette butts or ashes, make sure they are doused.

FIREPLACES

Keep fire where it belongs - in the fireplace! Make sure you have a screen large enough to catch flying sparks and rolling logs. Clean your chimney regularly - creosote build-up can ignite your chimney, roof and the whole house! Have your chimney inspected annually for damage and obstructions. Never place ashes in a plastic garbage can. Store cooled ashes outside in a tightly sealed metal container, not in your garage. Cardboard boxes and paper bags can quickly catch fire. Only burn materials appropriate for a fireplace, never burn trash or paper, burning paper can float up a chimney and onto your roof or into your yard.

CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS

Illinois law requires all homes to have a Carbon Monoxide (CO) detector within 15 feet of every room used for sleeping purposes. The only exemptions are: The building does not rely on combustion of fossil fuel for heat, ventilation, or hot water (in other words, all utilities are electric). However, if you are living in an apartment or condo and there is an underground or attached parking garage, you are required to have a Carbon Monoxide Detector. Change the batteries in your carbon monoxide detectors and smoke detectors.
